Examples of Citations for a Works Cited or Work Consulted Document

A Works Cited document lists the sources you used within your report.

A Works Consulted document lists the sources you investigated before you wrote your report.

A source may be listed on both your Works Cited list and your Works Consulted list if, for instance, you are indicating that you are citing one article but consulted another in the same source.

Book with one author (citing the entire book) =

Encyclopedia article with no author noted =
